1. Executive summary

The National Audit Office's Code of Audit Practice (the Code) requires us to report to those charged with governance – the Scrutiny and Audit Panel – on the work we have carried out to discharge our statutory audit responsibilities together with any governance issues identified. This report summarises the findings from the 2015/16 audit which is substantially complete. It includes messages arising from our audit of your financial statements and the results of the work we have undertaken to assess your arrangements to secure economy, efficiency and effectiveness in your use of resources.

Below are the results and conclusions on the significant areas of the audit process.

Status of the audit	We have substantially completed our audit of the financial statements of East Sussex Fire Authority for the year ended 2015/16. A number of detailed work areas remain in progress at 1 September 2016. We will provide a verbal update of our progress on the outstanding work areas at the 15 September 2016 meeting of the Scrutiny and Audit Panel.
	We have performed the procedures outlined in our Audit Plan and based on the procedures performed to date anticipate issuing an unqualified opinion on the Authority's financial statements.
	We expect to conclude that you have put in place proper arrangements to secure value for money in your use of resources.
	We expect to issue the audit certificate at the same time as the audit opinion.
Objections –	We have not received any objections to the 2015/16 accounts from members of the public.
Audit differences	There are no unadjusted or adjusted audit differences that we are required to report to you.
Scope and materiality	In our audit plan presented at the 25 May 2016 Scrutiny and Audit Panel meeting, we communicated that our audit procedures would be performed

In our audit plan presented at the 25 May 2016 Scrutiny and Audit Panel meeting, we communicated that our audit procedures would be performed using a materiality of £1,111,860 for the main financial statements and £209,660 for the pension fund. We have reassessed these based on the actual results for the financial year and have decreased the main financial statements amount to £1,075,320 because of a decrease in gross operating expenditure and increased the pension fund amount to £222,760 because of an increase in benefits payable.

The threshold for reporting audit differences which impact the financial statements has also decreased from £55,593 to £53,766 for the main financial statements and increased from £10,498 to £11,138 for the pension fund.

The basis of our assessment is 2% of gross operating expenditure for the main financial statements and 2% of benefits payable for the pension fund, which has remained consistent with prior years.

We carried out our work in accordance with our Audit Plan.

Significant audit risks We identified the following audit risk during the planning phase of our audit, and reported this to you in our audit plan: Risk of management override. The 'addressing audit risks' section of this report sets out how we have gained audit assurance over this issue. Other reporting issues We have no other matters we wish to report. Control observations We have not identified any significant deficiencies in the design or operation of an internal control that might result in a material misstatement in your financial statements of which you are not aware.

2. Responsibilities and purpose of our work

The Authority's responsibilities

The Authority is responsible for preparing and publishing its Statement of Accounts, accompanied by the Annual Governance Statement (AGS). In the AGS, the Authority reports publicly on the extent to which it complies with its own code of governance, including how it has monitored and evaluated the effectiveness of its governance arrangements in the year, and on any planned changes in the coming period.

The Authority is also responsible for putting in place proper arrangements to secure economy, efficiency and effectiveness in its use of resources.

Purpose of our work

Our audit was designed to:

- express an opinion on the 2015/16 financial statements and the consistency of other information published with them;
- report on an exception basis on the Annual Governance Statement;
- consider and report any matters that prevent us being satisfied that the Authority had put in place proper arrangements for securing economy, efficiency and effectiveness in the use of resources (the value for money conclusion); and
- discharge our statutory duties and responsibilities as established by the Local Audit and Accountability Act 2014 and Code of Audit Practice.

In addition, this report contains our findings related to the areas of audit emphasis and any views on significant deficiencies in internal control or the Authority's accounting policies and key judgments.

Alongside our work on the financial statements, we also review and report to the National Audit Office on your Whole of Government Accounts return. The extent of our review and the nature of our report are specified by the National Audit Office.

3. Financial statements audit

Addressing audit risks

We identified the following audit risk during the planning phase of our audit, and reported this to you in our Audit Plan. Here, we set out how we have gained audit assurance over this issue.

A significant audit risk in the context of the audit of the financial statements is an inherent risk with both a higher likelihood of occurrence and a higher magnitude of effect should it occur and which requires special audit consideration. For significant risks, we obtain an understanding of the entity's controls relevant to each risk and assess the design and implementation of the relevant controls.

Significant Risks (including fraud risks)

Risk of management override

As identified in ISA (UK and Ireland) 240, management is in a unique position to perpetrate fraud because of its ability to manipulate accounting records directly or indirectly and prepare fraudulent financial statements by overriding controls that otherwise appear to be operating effectively. We identify and respond to this fraud risk on every audit engagement.

Audit procedures performed

- Tested the appropriateness of journal entries recorded in the general ledger and other adjustments made in the preparation of the financial statements
- Reviewed accounting estimates for evidence of management bias:
- Evaluated the business rationale for any significant unusual transactions; and
- Evaluated the appropriateness of accounting policies against Code guidance and for changes from the prior period

Assurance gained and issues arising

Our audit work on journals and accounting estimates has not identified any evidence of management bias or significant unusual transactions and we have concluded that the accounting policies adopted are reasonable and in line with Code requirements.

We did not identify any matters that we need to bring to your attention.

We also identified the following non-significant audit risk during the planning phase of our audit, and reported this to you in our Audit Plan. Here, we set out how we have gained audit assurance over this issues.

Other Risks

In May 2015 the Pension
Ombudsman, an independent
organisation that investigates
complaints about pension
administration, published Mr
Milne's determination for the
Firefighters' Pension Scheme
regarding commutation factors.
The Pension Ombudsman ruled
that Government Actuary's
Department (GAD) failed to
review commutation factors within
the firefighters' pension scheme.

The Ombudsman ordered that a new commutation factor be prepared as if a factor review had been carried out in December 2004.

The Authority has determined the additional payments required. The sum of these payments is estimated to be £933k.

Audit procedures performed

- Reviewed and tested the Authority's arrangements for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of compensation;
- Re-performed the calculation of compensation for a sample of payments, including assessment of the accuracy of inputs; and
- Reviewed the associated disclosures in the financial statements to ensure compliance with the Code of Practice on Local Government Accounting, and appropriate accounting standards.

Assurance gained and issues arising

The Authority has calculated and accounted for the associated transactions in line with Code of Practice on Local Government Accounting, and appropriate accounting standards.

We did not identify any matters that we need to bring to your attention.

Other matters

As required by ISA (UK&I) 260 and other ISAs specifying communication requirements, we are required to communicate to you significant findings from the audit and other matters that are significant to you oversight of the Authority's financial reporting process, including the following:

- Qualitative aspects of your accounting practices; estimates and disclosures;
- Matters specifically required by other auditing standards to be communicated to those charged with governance. For example, issues about fraud, compliance with laws and regulations, external confirmations and related party transactions;
- Any significant difficulties encountered during the audit; and
- Other audit matters of governance interest

We have no matters we wish to report.

Control themes and observations

It is the responsibility of the Authority to develop and implement systems of internal financial control and to put in place proper arrangements to monitor their adequacy and effectiveness in practice. Our responsibility as your auditor is to consider whether the Authority has put adequate arrangements in place to satisfy itself that the systems of internal financial control are both adequate and effective in practice.

We have tested the controls of the Authority only to the extent necessary for us to complete our audit. We are not expressing an opinion on the overall effectiveness of internal control.

We have not identified any significant deficiencies in the design or operation of an internal control that might result in a material misstatement in your financial statements of which you are not aware

We have reviewed the Annual Governance Statement and can confirm that it not misleading or inconsistent with other information forthcoming from the audit or our knowledge of the Authority.

Request for written representations

We have requested a management representation letter to gain management's confirmation in relation to a number of matters.

Whole of Government Accounts

Alongside our work on the financial statements, we also review and report to the National Audit Office on your Whole of Government Accounts return. The extent of our review and the nature of our report are specified by the National Audit Office.

We are currently concluding our work in this area and will report any matters that arise to the Scrutiny and Audit Panel.

4. Value for money



We are required to consider whether the Authority has put in place 'proper arrangements' to secure economy, efficiency and effectiveness on its use of resources. This is known as our value for money conclusion.

Proper arrangements are defined by statutory guidance issued by the National Audit Office. They comprise your arrangements to:

- ► Take informed decisions;
- Deploy resources in a sustainable manner; and
- Work with partners and other third parties.

Overall conclusion

We did not identify any significant risks in relation to these criteria.

We have performed the procedures outlined in our audit plan. We did not identify any significant weaknesses in the Authority's arrangements to ensure it took properly informed decisions and deployed resources to achieve planned and sustainable outcomes for taxpayers and local people.

We therefore expect to conclude that you have put in place proper arrangements to secure value for money in your use of resources.

Appendix A - Independence

We confirm there are no changes in our assessment of independence since our confirmation in our Audit Plan dated 12 May 2016.

We complied with the Auditing Practices Board's Ethical Standards for Auditors and the requirements of the Public Sector Audit Appointments Ltd (PSAA)'s Terms of Appointment. In our professional judgement the firm is independent and the objectivity of the audit engagement partner and audit staff has not been compromised within the meaning of regulatory and professional requirements.

We confirm that we have met the reporting requirements to the Scrutiny and Audit Panel, as 'those charged with governance' under International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland) 260 – Communication with those charged with governance. Our communication plan to meet these requirements was set out in our Audit Plan of 12 May 2016.
